PROMOTING RENEWAL DYNAMICS IN MEMBER COUNTRIES

The FAR Network strengthens synergies between different actors:

- it fosters the development of national multiactor networks (public or private training centres, farmers' organizations, etc.) serving agricultural and rural training systems.
- it supports local initiatives of training centres/networks and farmers' organizations. 16 two-year initiatives are currently benefitting from technical and financial support to help them develop sustainable agricultural training systems in diverse fields: training engineering, educational engineering, integration of agroecology in agricultural education systems, and socio-professional integration systems.

COMMUNICATION AND KNOWLEDGE MANAGEMENT

Identifying, analysing and showcasing ATVET initiatives in member countries and elsewhere are core network activities. The FAR Network provides information and exchange tools to promote dialogue between agricultural and rural training actors.

TRAINING AND CAPACITY BUILDING

ATVET actors pursue their activities at the interface of different sectors: education, labour market, private sector, farmers' and trade associations, public and private training provision. They must address the human, economic and educational challenge of ensuring the long-term viability of their activities. The FAR Network brings actors together, encourages the sharing of practices and experience, trains and fosters synergy between them in various knowledge areas: social and professional integration of youth, renewal of ATVET programmes, professional frameworks, training economics, gender-sensitive training programmes, sustainable agriculture, etc.

 Examples: pedagogical training workshop for teachers at ENAFA in Matourkou, Burkina Faso (2023); study trip to Cameroon for a Malian delegation from professional training centres on training rural youth and promoting their integration (2022); training workshop in Niger on agricultural training design and technology approaches and tools (2022); and a training workshop in Togo for centre managers on training economics (2022).

THE MIFAR MASTER'S DEGREE PROGRAMME – TAILORED TRAINING TO BECOME AN ACTOR OF CHANGE IN AFRICA

The MIFAR professional Master's degree programme trains students to become specialists in agricultural instructional technology. It is coordinated by the FAR Network with the support of three academic institutions (ENSETP-UCAD in Senegal, ENA-Meknès in Morocco and Institut Agro in France), which provide complementary educational science and agricultural development expertise. MIFAR, which was launched in 2022, offers one-year training degree courses, mainly via distance learning. Around 20 students are enrolled yearly.

EXPERTISE

One of the strong points of the FAR Network is the expertise it is able to mobilize among its members and partners to boost the quality of ATVET systems. It prioritizes proven local expertise and develops a pool of qualified men and women experts.

The Network can be approached to co-develop ATVET policies, participate in the identification, feasibility and assessment of ATVET projects and programmes, provide advisory support or offer its expertise at different levels in specific fields (agricultural training centre strategy, training economics, etc.).

It also helps partners specify their needs, while sometimes co-funding expert appraisals within its scope of activities.

 Examples: identification of training needs for an international irrigated agriculture network (2024); ATVET assessment in Liberia (2021) and Guinea Bissau (2022); and a feasibility study for an ATVET support project in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (2021).

PUBLIC POLICY SUPPORT AND LEVERAGING

The FAR Network is a committed long-term partner to national authorities and technical and financial institutions. It is a major actor—through a network of men and women involved in ATVET at different strategic levels in 19 African countries—in facilitating dialogue and producing lasting impacts on in its member countries.
